Jacobs Novelty Company, Stevens Point Wisconsin

The company was founded by the second generation of the pioneer family that immigrated from Reinsfeld in the area Trier-Saarburg in Germany to the Wisconsin Valley, and established the hotel 'Jacobs House' in 1875.


The family headed by Nicholas Jacobs Sr. (1841-1916) and his wife Catherine (1847-1896) had three sons and three daughters, and the second son Nicholas C. Jacobs Jr. was after a few years of employment at the local railroad offices the proprietor of the 'Spot Saloon' at 1105 Main Street, and also daily manager of the 'Jacobs House' at 441 Clark Street in Stevens Point until 1904. The youngest daughter Gertrude Mary (1882-1965) and her husband Oliver T. Olson (1882-1931) then managed the family owned hotel until 1928, when it was finally giving way for new buildings.

When Nicholas C. Jacobs Jr. left the management of the hotel in 1904, he officially established the Jacobs Novelty Co. at 209 Strongs Avenue to market phonographs


and automatic musical instruments. It was a successful company and music store, and in 1920 the building at 207-209 Strongs Avenue was extended and remodeled. In the late twenties the Jacobs Novelty Co. was also involved in the slot machine business. Nicholas C. Jacobs Jr. (1871-1936) and his wife Helena (1873-1953) had three sons, Louis Aloisius, Raymond Phillip, and Paul William. The oldest son Louis A. Jacobs and his wife Helen, married in 1916, established The Badger Garage to trade tractors, automobiles, and trucks, and they were selling agents for Chevrolet in the twenties at 211-213 Strongs Avenue in Stevens Point.



Louis A. Jacobs became involved in the phonograph business through his brother Raymond and of course his father Nicholas, and around the time his father passed away Louis took over management of the family company, and developed the line of commercial phonographs known today among collectors. In December 1940 the Replacement Cabinet Co. was incorporated by Louis, his brother Paul, and James G. Harding (1895-1966). The purpose of the company was to manufacture and sell cabinets and parts of cabinets for phonographs, radios, and other instruments. Helen passed away in 1945, and a year later Louis married Marian Lucile Ells, who had been widowed with a son in 1932. Louis A. Jacobs was for a few years proprietor of 'The Rocket Club', a restaurant near Wisconsin Rapids before retirement, moving to Clintonville. Louis A. Jacobs passed away on the 13th December 1957 at the hospital in Clintonville. A lifelong disadvantage for Louis was that he lost his right hand only thirteen years old in a hunting accident on the 27th March 1907.



The younger brother Paul William took over the activities of the Jacobs Novelty Co. from Louis in February 1956, and managed the company until he died on the 23rd March 1966. The second brother Raymond Phillip was a talented musician, and was several years touring the country, playing cornet in the Ringling Brothers Circus band, and later established his own Ray Jacobs Music Store. He was married to Maryanna Mosey and lived his life in Stevens Point until he passed away on the 24th April 1980, and the story of the pioneer family involved in the phonograph company history had come to an end. Most of the Jacobs family members are interred at the Saint Stephen Cemetery in Stevens Point, Portage County. Paul William Jacobs was cremated and buried at the Wisconsin Memorial Park in Brookfield.


